

<p><b>Travel and Journey:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• An introduction to the theme of journeys – their own journeys and famous journeys</li><li>• Metaphorical journeys</li><li>• Exploration of the importance of text and context</li><li>• The role of punctuation in creating a narrative voice</li><li>• Tone, style and organisation</li><li>• Use of vocabulary to create impact</li><li>• Characterisation – introduce the role play</li><li>• Creative writing – develop and create their own journey description</li><li>• Summarising, analysing and comparing key texts</li><li>• Poetic analysis</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• <b>FORMAL ASSESSMENT:</b> Close analysis of a piece of travel writing – exploring writer's thoughts and feelings</li><li>• Description of a real or metaphorical journey</li><li>• Spoken Language – role play characterisation task</li><li>• Keyword test</li></ul>
<p><b>Poetry Across Time and Place:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Introduction to Early and Middle English and the oral tradition</li><li>• The Elizabethan era and the sonnet form</li><li>• Exploring Metaphysical poetry</li><li>• Introduction to and analysis of the Romantic poets</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• <b>FORMAL ASSESSMENT:</b> Poetry comparison – how poets reveal their feelings about place.</li><li>• Spoken Language – teaching activity to inform and explain key features of a poem</li></ul>
